	Meeting point in front of the <u>Jewish Community Center</u> with synagogue, Am Brixener Hof 2, Regensburg
	In the Jewish Community Center, you will have the opportunity to visit the new synagogue and discuss the architecture and rituals. Afterwards, we will follow the 1,000-year history of the Jewish community on a city tour through the old town. We stop off at Neupfarrplatz with traces of the medieval Jewish town and the artwork by Israeli artist Dani Karavan inviting to an interfaith exchange. The sculptures at St. Peter's Cathedral remind that incitement and slander ended tragically for members of the Jewish community. A new heyday of Jewish life was made possible by the Kingdom of Bavaria in the 19 th century. The Stumbling Stones commemorate Jewish citizens who worked in Regensburg and were deported and murdered during the National Socialist era.
	The city tour will end at the Old Town Hall, seat of the Perpetual Reichstag.
